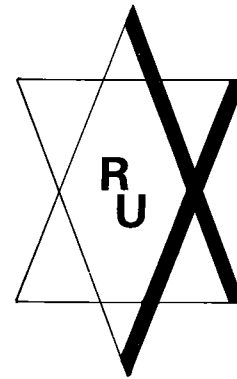

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## INTRODUCTION

Membership of a synagogue is the most widely held point of identity for British Jews. All contemporary studies in this country have shown that synagogue membership covers the vast majority of identifying Jews. The formation of a synagogue or congregation does not necessitate a building or even a minister. Membership is a voluntary act and requires payment of membership dues. The figures which follow therefore relate to fee paying members as at the latter part of 1982 and early 1983.

This publication follows the method, format and definitions of earlier studies on synagogue membership undertaken by the Research Unit. It can only give a rough guide to population figures. Firstly, it includes only the synagogue affiliated Jewish population. Secondly, there is a small amount of over enumeration because of the possibility of dual membership by individuals and/or households. Detailed research on 5,500 households in Redbridge suggests multiple membership is less than 2 per cent. Thirdly, in some of the London boroughs affiliation is unrealistic with regard to residence. Notably, in Tower Hamlets there is a generation lag as many former residents of the borough retain membership for sentimental reasons, and in Westminster social prestige rather than convenient access is often the motivation for membership of the many large, fashionable synagogues. The lack of synagogues in Barking, Bexley, Islington and Southwark reflects the small number of Jews living in these boroughs, not their total absence. This is particularly evident in the case of Barking, where the nearest synagogue (Barking & Becontree) is just outside the borough of Redbridge, yet as its name suggests, it draws its membership largely from Barking. Outside London similar patterns occur. In areas of sparse Jewish population a synagogue in a particular town often draws its membership from a wide area and there can be overlapping 'catchments' between synagogues. The most important caveat, however, relates to female membership which is dealt with in the note below.

In 1983 there were 328 congregations with a total male membership of 78,899 and an independent female membership of 30,527. These totals suggest that there were 109,426 household memberships. There were 295 synagogue buildings. The distribution of membership among the various religious groupings shows a greater preponderance of the Central Orthodox outside London. The capital offers a variety of types of synagogue in its large population. Only Greater Manchester shares this heterogeneity.

A detailed analysis of the changes in synagogue membership patterns since 1970, and particularly since our last Research Unit report in 1977 are dealt with in the concluding section of this publication.

## NOTE ON FEMALE SYNAGOGUE MEMBERSHIP

Certain adjustments have had to be made in respect of female membership because of the different policies towards women. In Orthodox synagogues married women are not counted as members unless they themselves join and pay an individual subscription, whereas in progressive Synagogues (Reform and Liberal) women and men have equal membership and total membership therefore often includes two adults per household. In order to produce uniform statistics, the following categories have been used in estimating female membership:-

- a) In some cases synagogues made returns giving a gender breakdown of their membership in which female numbers exceeded those of the males. Using the 1977 figures as a guide to the number of households, the excess figure is taken to account for individual female membership. In these cases only the difference between female and male membership is included in our statistics. These are identified in the text with the letter 'a' in Tables 1:4 and 2:2.
- b) Where no breakdown by sex was available, the estimated numbers of females have been bracketed and excluded from the total female membership figure.

By this method, the totals of female membership recorded comprise single women, widows, divorcees and some married women who choose to hold membership in their own right. In most Orthodox synagogues this last group is a small minority of the female membership. Stanmore United Synagogue is an exception to this rule in that a local membership drive encouraged women to hold individual membership. These figures do not provide a conclusive breakdown of female and male headed households; their value is in estimating the approximate number of synagogue affiliated households. This constraint has necessitated the use of male membership figures as the most reliable indicator of distribution among synagogue groupings.

**Section 3**  
**TRENDS IN SYNAGOGUE MEMBERSHIP 1970-1983**

The National Picture

In 1983 there was a total of 328 religious congregations in the U.K. This was a decline from 351 in 1977 and 368 in 1970.\* The proportionate fall in the number of congregations is much greater than the fall in membership during the same period. This is mainly due to the closure of synagogues in areas of declining Jewish population in the inner cities of the large metropolitan centres, and depressed regions such as South Wales and the North-East of England. Another feature of recent years has been the merger of congregations in the interests of financial viability. The increased running costs which have resulted in the closure and amalgamation of synagogues have also led to a decline in the number of synagogue buildings from 345 in 1970, to 315 in 1977, and 295 in 1983.

In the period 1970 to 1977 male synagogue membership declined at an annual average rate of 0.9%. Between 1977 and 1983, the annual average decline was 0.8%. In the latter part of the period the actual numerical loss slowed as shown in Table 3.1. The overall predominance of synagogue membership within the Greater London Council area has hardly changed at 67.9% in 1970 and 67.6% in 1983. However, in the early period up to 1977, the loss of male members in Greater London was nearly three times that in provincial congregations. Yet since 1977 the position has reversed with the provinces now showing an annual average decline of 1.2% compared with 0.6% in Greater London. This recent loss of male members outside London is surprising in the light of the rise of new and larger congregations in the Home Counties which are included in the provincial totals.

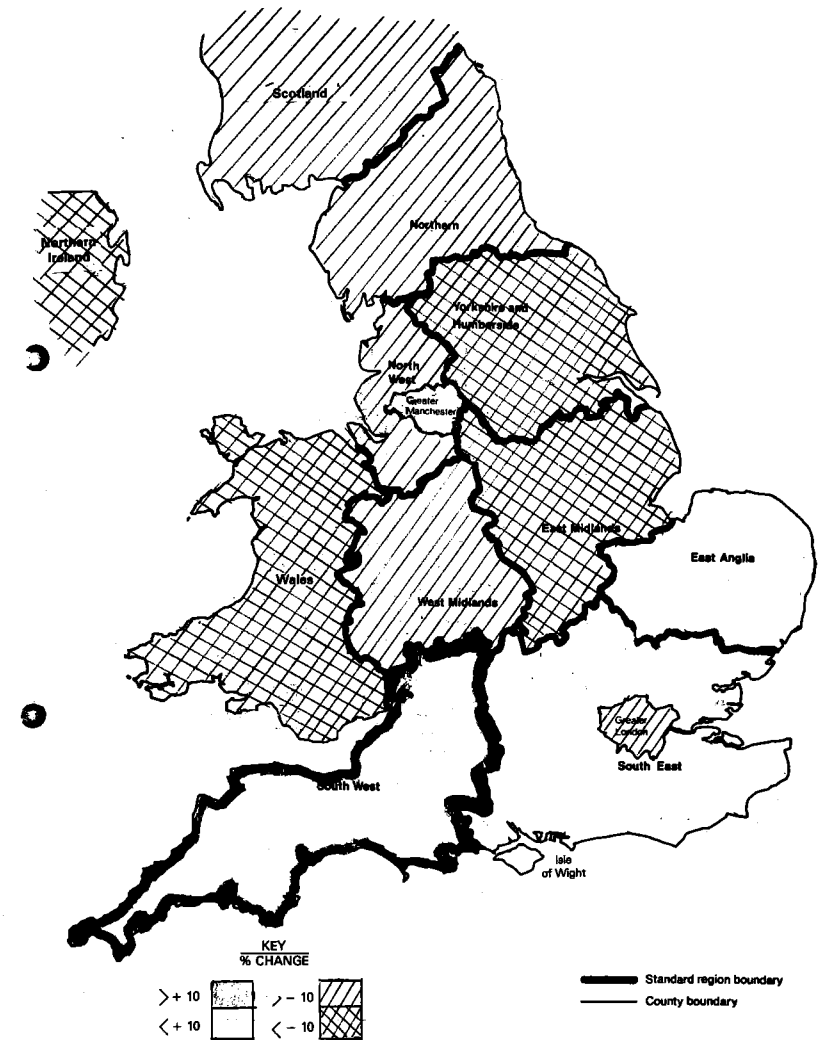

However, whereas male synagogue membership has declined 4.9% since 1977, the total number of household memberships has only declined by 1.8%. The concept of family membership of synagogues and the failure to differentiate between the sexes as regards membership has been a noticeable feature of returns from synagogues in recent years even among Orthodox congregations. This possibly reflects the growing trend towards increasing female membership in all synagogue groups. Social and demographic changes in the Jewish communities have led to a growing number of independent female memberships in line with the general growth in the numbers of widows, single parents, spinsters, and women who have married-out but wish to maintain their ties with Judaism. The increasing number of female-headed households also suggests a trend towards a smaller average household size among British Jews, which is in keeping with trends in the general population in the U.K.

Total household synagogue membership which includes data on females who hold membership of synagogues independently or in their own right, has only been collected nationally since 1977. The last 6 years has seen a rise in the number of female synagogue members by 2066 or 7.3%. In 1983 independent females comprised 27.9% of total household memberships nationally as compared with 25.5% in 1977. Females in the provinces hold 29% of household memberships and their net gain of 8.2% since 1977 is above the national average. This trend reflects the increasing agedness of many provincial communities, a major outcome of which is the decline of male members in the provinces, with widows replacing their husbands as the household synagogue member.

#### Regional Change

As Table 3.2 shows between 1977 and 1983 male synagogue membership exhibited a decline in every region of the country, except the South-east outside of Greater London with a modest increase of 2.5%. The areas of greatest decline were the East Midlands (35%), Northern Ireland (34%), Wales (19%), East Anglia (16%) and Yorkshire and Humberside region (14%).

However, male membership is no longer an accurate reflection of shifts in population as it exaggerates trends. Household membership declined at a slower rate as a result of the increasing female membership. As can be seen from Map 3, four areas recorded net gains between 1977 and 1983. The South-west (in effect Bournemouth) grew by 12%, East Anglia by 5%, the South-east, excluding Greater London, by 5%, and Greater Manchester by 4%. The largest proportionate losses were suffered by Northern Ireland (25%), the East Midlands (22%), Wales (15%), and Yorkshire and Humberside region (11%).

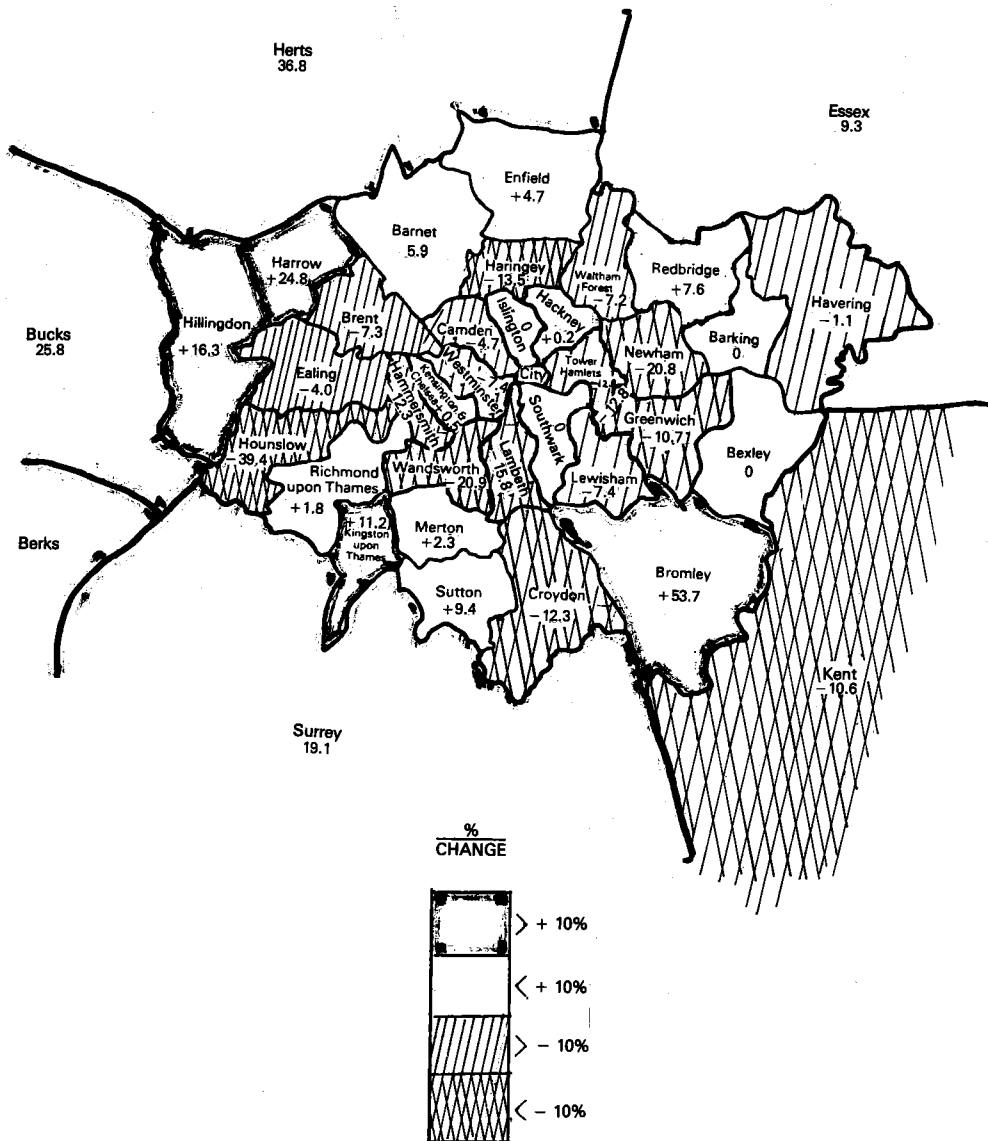

This type of data raises the question of the application of the male-female ratio as an indicator of demographic change. Areas with a high male-female ratio, such as Hertfordshire with 5.7 are undoubtedly areas where the Jewish population has a young average age. On the other hand where the ratio is below 2, such as Scotland (1.3), the West Midlands (1.6) and East Sussex (really Brighton & Hove at 1.9) it suggests ageing and declining Jewish populations. Overall, the U.K. ratio is 2.6. However, given the varying sizes of the synagogue memberships by region and their different compositions as regards synagogue groupings, these ratios are only of limited use except in extreme cases.

#### Geographic Changes in Greater London

The figures for Greater London refer exclusively to the area of the Greater London Council and the 33 London boroughs. However, an understanding of the recent changes in London must include an assessment of the situation in the adjacent Home Counties. Although household membership in Greater London has fallen by 1.2% in the last 6 years, it has grown by 4.7% in the Home Counties. For example, in Hertfordshire, synagogues gained over 400 households, approximately half the loss for Greater London as a whole. Map 4 shows that in overall terms, the synagogues in the central areas have declined at the expense of those on the

periphery. In addition there is a general trend towards growth in the west at the expense of the east with the exceptions of Redbridge and Bromley. For example, large proportionate gains are shown in the counties of Buckinghamshire, Hertfordshire and Berkshire, and the London Boroughs of Harrow and Hillingdon. The old dominance of synagogues in Westminster and Tower Hamlets is rapidly declining so that in 1983 Barnet's memberships alone almost equalled total membership of synagogues in both the West and East Ends.

The male female ratio varies from low ratios in inner London eg. Hammersmith 1.2 to 1, Tower Hamlets 1.5, Lambeth & Newham 1.6, to high ratios in the outer boroughs eg. Hounslow 5.7, Kingston 5.2, Sutton 4.8, Havering and Hillingdon 4.3. As a general principle it appears possible in London to use the sex ratio to differentiate population loss because of movement of people eg. in Hounslow and Havering, from loss by mortality, eg. in Hammersmith and Newham.

As a general rule in Britain, the establishment of new synagogues tends to follow the geographical movement of the Jewish population rather than precede it. Such migration in turn is based on changes in the social class composition, occupational profile and outlook of the Jewish population. Unfortunately information on the interplay between these social indicators and membership of synagogue groupings is not available. However, certain features do stand out. An obvious one, which relates to the geography of London Jewry is that all the Right-Wing Orthodox synagogues are to be found in two boroughs (Barnet and Hackney) and moreover are concentrated in particular areas of those boroughs. The fact that the members of such synagogues are geographically constrained by their Sabbath observance means that only in this instance can residential patterns be closely related to the location of synagogues. In the case of other synagogue groups, however, it is not possible to identify such a clear-cut relationship between residential patterns and synagogue location.

Changes in the Membership among Synagogue Groupings

Reform and Liberal synagogue membership is largely based on a system of family memberships. The definitional complications for inter-group comparisons this produces was referred to in the Introduction. In the face of the imprecise nature of the female membership figures discussed above, male membership is the most reliable indicator of change in this sphere. Moreover, female membership is more dominated than male membership by the Central Orthodox grouping. 88% nationally and 90% in London of female membership is Central Orthodox. This also suggests that the age-structure of the various synagogue groupings is different since the independent female membership is still largely made up of widows. Male membership therefore covers a wider age spectrum and its demographic characteristics are more representative of the affiliated population.

Table 3.3 shows the changes in the general distribution in the U.K. between 1977 and 1983. The most striking feature is that the decline in the membership of the Central Orthodox grouping was greater than the total national decline. The Sephardi and Liberal groupings which also showed net declines in membership, maintained their proportion of the national total, since their numerical loss was in line with the national average. The Right-Wing Orthodox and Reform both grew substantially in this period. Indeed the figures suggest that there has been a movement from the Central Orthodox towards these two groups.

In the provincial communities, the small size of the local Jewish populations tends to limit the viability of new types of synagogue. Table 1.2 shows that synagogues in the provinces are less than half the size on average (154 male members) than those in London (329 male members). As a result the Central Orthodox grouping which is the historical Anglo-Jewish tradition tends to dominate in the provinces with 80% of the male membership.

It is in Greater London that there is a real choice of type of synagogue, and so its distribution pattern is much more indicative of 'consumer taste'. Moreover, in London figures are available over a longer period. The trends identified for the national pattern are even more strongly featured in Table 3.4. The Right-Wing Orthodox have doubled their proportion of the total since 1970, and the Reform have increased their proportion of the total by more than a third. Despite the general numerical decline in male synagogue membership in Greater London, both these groups have shown substantial gains of members. These London figures again not only show that the Central Orthodox losses outweigh total losses, but also that the Sephardi grouping has also suffered considerably.

Demographic Insights

All the demographic studies in recent years have shown a greater decline in the size of Anglo-Jewry than these synagogue figures suggest. For instance, it is estimated on the basis of mortality statistics that Anglo-Jewry numbered 354,000 in 1977 and had declined to 337,000 by 1983<sup>1</sup>. On the other hand, synagogue membership figures suggest that on the basis of a general U.K. average of 2.7 persons per household<sup>2</sup>, the number of affiliated households declined by only 2,000, from 111,000 to 109,000 in the same period. This suggests that the affiliated proportion of Anglo-Jewry has in fact risen, from 85% in 1977 to 88% in 1983. Whereas Anglo-Jewry as a whole has declined by 17,000 it is estimated that the total population living in households affiliated to synagogues has only declined by 4,250, from 299,700 to 295,450. Although these figures are only estimates, they do suggest a trend to a more synagogue oriented population as the size of Anglo-Jewry declines. This trend should be reinforced by the rise in female membership, since one of the most outstanding features of the study Jewish Identity in an Anglo-Jewish Community,<sup>3</sup> was the higher religiosity and commitment of Jewish women as against Jewish men.

A comparison of the 1983 membership figures and recent vital statistics shows that the general dynamic between the two main streams of Anglo-Jewry, the orthodox and progressive movements, is beginning to develop an established pattern among the younger generation. This is apparent from Table 3.5 which shows that the marriage pattern is more similar to the distribution of synagogue membership than the mortality pattern, which largely relates to a population over the age of 70 years.

Once again these indicators show that the Right-Wing Orthodox and the Reform groupings are increasing proportionately both generally and within their own streams of Judaism. Nevertheless, Central Orthodoxy maintains its commanding position, and despite the increasing challenges from 'left' and 'right' its numerical domination of Anglo-Jewry's synagogue scene will continue for the foreseeable future.
